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

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## LEGISLATIVE CORNER



## 40, 160, 2 and 3

Quite a jumble of numbers and who would use numbers for the title of an article? What is this all about? Well, let's get right into it. As you read on, I hope you will realize that these numbers do have significance for our sport. We can find the answer and meaning of both 40 and 160 by looking to the Massachusetts Legislature. The governing legislative body in this state is the Massachusetts General Court which consists of 40 Senators and 160 Representatives. These 200 legislators are the officials who represent the six million people living in Massachusetts. Both branches of the legislature are elected and serve two- year terms.

To find the answer to the meaning of the number 2, let's look at the Executive Branch of Government. The Executive Branch of the Government is under the Governor, and it consists of numerous agencies overseeing various aspects of government. At this point it might help to point out that the agency leaders are appointed positions as opposed to the legislators who are in elected positions. And this is where we find the 2 primary agencies that have a direct effect and impact on the trails of the Snowmobile Association of Massachusetts (SAM). The 2 agencies are the Mass. Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) and the Department of Fisheries and Wildlife (DF&W). These 2 agencies intersect with our sport through the many existing miles of SAM's Statewide Snowmobile Trail System or SSTS that lie within our DCR parks and the few trails within DF&W lands. These  ${f 2}$ agencies own almost six hundred thousand

acres or about ten percent of the six million acres in Massachusetts. So, you can see why it is hard to make new trails or trail connections without "bumping" into either DCR or DF&W lands.

And SAM currently does have a program to increase the viability of the SSTS with its' goal of adding **3** new, critical trail connections within the SSTS. As part

of SAM's goals for the future, SAM has defined **3** critical, key "connections" in the SSTS that are crucial to our snowmobiling friends in the regional areas below and that all sledders can help put into place.

• First is the crossing of Route 9 in Hadley which involves a short stretch of the DCR- owned Norwottuck Rail Trail and the tunnel under Route 9.

#### Upon reviewing the Statewide Snowmobile Trail System map, it became apparent

#### that adding some "missing links" into the system had to be a priority.

- Second is a connection between Belchertown and Shutesbury through the DCR-owned remote Off-Reservation Quabbin land.
- Third is a connection between Harvard and Lancaster across the DF&W-owned Bolton Flats.

Several years ago, SAM had made a formal request to both DCR and DF&W to work collaboratively with these agencies to integrate these **3** critical connections into the trail system. I am encouraged to state that, while DF&W has not yet rendered a decision on the Bolton Flats connection, there are productive, regular meetings between SAM and DF&W for the trails on their lands.

Consequently, to date, there has yet to be a positive response from DCR regarding both the Route 9 and Belchertown-to-Shutesbury connections.

This is where I would like to give a BIG THANK YOU to *Representative Dan Carey* (2nd Hampshire District); *Senator Jo Comerford* (Hampshire, Franklin and Worcester District); *Senator Anne Gobi* (Worcester, Hampden, Hampshire and Middlesex District); and *Representative Natalie Blais* (1st Franklin District) for their time, talent and effort at keeping these projects moving forward. They have all been very supportive of our 3 Trails Project, so please take the time to thank them when speaking with them. So, how do we "move the needle"? It is important to point out that <u>your</u> support and help are needed to "move the needle". We need your ideas, your connections and your strategies in this effort. Your legislative Chairperson, Sue Smiley, and the members of the legislative Committee would very much appreciate any suggestions, ideas or information that you could offer. 
## SPECIAL DEDICATION: The Loss of Jim Hoellerich

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

# "Quebec Excellent Adventure"

his trip was planned by members of Easy Rider's Snowmobile Club out of Marlboro MA. The Club is a travelling Snowmobile Club, we go where the snow flies! Unfortunately for us, last year was a down year for snowfall, for all but the most Northern Regions. A few exceptions being areas North of the Moosehead Lake Region, Maine, the very tip of NH, in Quebec and parts of New Brunswick, Canada



#### JACKMAN MAINE TO LA POCATIERE QUEBEC

Larry McCullough and myself began our trip on Saturday, February 26, under minimal snow depth and icy conditions. Thankfully, prior to our leaving in the morning, the Jackman Maine region had received 4" of snow overnight. This fresh snow, although very dry, allowed our sleds just enough lubrication and moisture to keep our 4-stroke sleds lubed and cool.

The temps were below zero at 6:30AM when we got up in the morning and as bad luck would have it, my sled wouldn't start. Fortunately, there was a Snowmobile Dealership less than a mile from the hotel (Jackman Power Sports). After gathering a few extra hands in the parking lot of the hotel, we managed to push the dead sled up into the trailer and drove off to the Dealer at 7:30AM. Once at Jackman Power Sports, due to our unscheduled arrival, we had to wait a bit before being tended too. In the meantime my sled was brought into the shop. By the time the technician attended to my sled, it had warmed up and of course started. A "frozen relay" was the culprit.

After paying the dealer for essentially warming up my sled, we loaded the sled back onto the trailer and arrived back at the hotel around 8:30AM. We then had to re-load our luggage back onto the sleds. When we finally hit the trail, it was now 9:00AM, 2 hours behind schedule on a day we would be riding nearly 235 miles and crossing for the first time into Canada with all the new Covid-19 Entry requirements.

After going through Canadian Customs uneventfully, other than Larry needing to take a Covid test once he got to our hotel that

night, we stopped for lunch at Club De Motoneigistes Liniere-Marlow, the first club you come across on Trail 75 after crossing into Canada. Trail 75 was very icy with just a thin coating of powder on top, which essentially blew off as you rode. These conditions persisted until just a few miles North of Club De Motoneigistes Liniere-Marlow when the trail suddenly became hard packed snow without any ice. Evidently that was the rain, ice and snow line last Winter. From that point North the snow was ideal and continued to get deeper and deeper as we headed towards "the Parc regional du Massif du Sud" and Mount Du-Midi.

When we arrived at the park, we took the access trail to the top of Mount Du-Midi. This was well worth the effort. The views from the top were breathtaking. You could see the St. Lawrence River in the distance and all the windfarms that straddle the tops of the hills for miles upon miles.

Once back on the trail, we needed to get moving so we would arrive before sunset, however a Moose had other plans for us. With the snow now 4-6 feet deep off the trail, a Moose felt it was easier to travel along Trail 547 for several miles than through the deep snow. Eventually the Moose left the trail allowing us to finally make it to our destination in La Pocatiere, albeit 2 hours after sunset.





Hiboux Du Kamouraska, Saint-Onesime, Quebec was our first stop in the AM and unfortunately closed. We ran into this issue often on this trip as many clubs and establishments had not re-opened since Covid-19 hit.

#### LA POCATIERE TO RIMOUSKI, QUEBEC

**Day 2** began with bitter cold temps and winds gusting over 40 mph off the St. Lawrence River. What we didn't observe the night before on the trails leading into the hotel due to the darkness, was the barren landscapes with acre upon acre of open farmland. This extreme wind over the open farmland created whiteout conditions, hiding the Orange Trail Stakes.

On many occasions during the first 40 miles we would find ourselves off the marked trail. Fortunately, the wind had packed the snow off the trail down to the point where it was like concrete. By mid morning we were back in the hills with Balsam lined trails protected from the wind. Our next stop was the very busy, Club Les Melles Pistes du Rocher blanc. After a cup of hot cocoa we pressed on. We had decided to take Trail 35 that morning and we ended up on Lake Pohenegamock, just north of Estcourt Maine. It was kind of cool arriving there from the Quebec side of the border as we have been there before crossing into Quebec from Maine at the Escourt Station Border Crossing.

The trails were wide, smooth and fast and we were making great time until just after noon when a vicious snow squall hit. We were miles from any place warm to stop and we literally crawled along the trails. The squall dropped nearly 6 inches of snow in an hour, once again making it difficult to stay within the marked trails. Eventually the snow lightened up and we found a little Restaurant to stop and grab some lunch at in Saint Cyprien. After lunch we headed NW after going NE for quite some time and back into the rolling hills and farm country. As the distance between us, the St. Lawrence River and our destination shortened, the farms increased in number, with farmlands stretching the horizon.

After another great day on the trails we arrived in Rimouski, this time before sunset.

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Day 3 began without any issues leaving Rimouski. We were treated to a beautiful sunrise and the sleds were running great. As we rode South towards New Brunswick, all the Trails had been groomed overnight. We were the first sleds on the trail for more than 60 miles. They were some of the finest trails I've been on in years, especially Trail 35.

We continued riding South in Quebec on Trail 35 until we took the access trail connecting Quebec to New Brunswick. The access trail was a shared road, but it eventually turned into NB 135. Once in New Brunswick, the snow was nothing short of a snowmobiler's dream. The trails were wide, smooth and with plenty of elevation changes. We reached Moose Valley at lunchtime and had lunch with Josie, the "Hostess Extraordinaire." It was great to be back there, unfortunately we were the only Americans there. The place was uncharacteristically quiet. After lunch we continued





SW through New Brunswick's beautiful Balsam lined Trails 17, 39 and 41 all the way to the U.S. border crossing at Ft. Kent, Maine.

As we approached Ft. Kent we could see a large and very high column of thick black smoke. Luckily for us, it wasn't our hotel, but the major fire would factor into our plans for the night. The fire had caused a closure to all the businesses on Rt. 1 in downtown Ft. Kent, including the gas station and restaurants.

Once in Clair, N.B., we could not get to the Border Crossing from Trail 41. We had to find a way through the alleys that had not been used or groomed due to the lack of Snowmobilers crossing the border. Frustrated, I eventually decided to go over a large snow pile to get to the Border Crossing across the street, only to bury my sled at the top. After an hour of digging myself out, we finally crossed the border into Ft. Kent.

#### **DRY 4** 215 MILES FT. KENT, MAINE, TO SHERMAN, MAINE

Day 4 began with a trip to Fort Kent Powersports to have my throttle cable adjusted. Per usual, FKPS came through without any waiting. They are hands down the best Yamaha Dealership in the North East and Danny the Chief Mechanic is second to none.

Once on the trails, we rode South on ITS 85, 85a, 81 and 83 through Eagle Lake, Portage Lake, Ashland, Oxbow, Shin Pond and lastly Sherman.

Our first stop in the morning was at Eagle Lake for fuel and a hot cocoa. If you have never been to "The County" you truly need to put it on your bucket list. Outside of the Gaspe Region and Northern New Brunswick, there isn't any better riding around. Miles upon miles of uninterrupted trails, with every type of scenery you can imagine. Not to mention all the wildlife you may come across, such as Moose, Deer, Black Bear, Fox, Bald Eagles and Lynx. We were fortunate on this trip to see many Moose, Deer and Bald Eagles.

Sadly as we progressed South of Ashland the snow conditions were deteriorating. We started to run into thin snow and icy conditions, especially on the well travelled trails. We stopped for lunch in Oxbow at the Homestead Lodge, home of the Bison. This is a must stop on your travels through Northern Maine.

After lunch we continued onto Shin Pond for fuel and then our last stop for the day in Sherman. We reached Sherman just as it was getting dark. The trails were pretty thin on this last leg. Snow was desperately needed for our last day ahead of us and as we were unloading our sleds for the night at the hotel, it unexpectedly began to snow!

Day 5 and our last day of riding started off with the best news we could have hoped for. Six inches of unforecast snow had fallen over night. It was a beautiful and much needed site to wake up to. With the new snow, we were once again treated to nearly a full day of riding on unbroken trails.

Day 5 was a day filled with beautiful scenery. The Moosehead Lake Region is filled with some of the most beautiful landscapes in the U.S.A. Our first stop for the day would be the B52 Memorial. This is a sobering location, knowing the fate of those onboard the downed B52. We paid our respects and continued onto Greenville, Maine. Riding to there was amazing. Normally the Millinocket/Greenville area is a bumpy ride due to all the sled traffic, but on this day it was smooth. We had lunch in Greenville Center and unlike Moose Valley Sporting Lodge, the place was hopping. While enjoying lunch we deliberated over the pros and cons of travelling 20 miles across Moosehead Lake. Our plan was to have enough time to visit Coburn Mountain.

While we were discussing this, we were advised by a few patrons that the Lake Trail was well marked, safe and on our GPS units to follow. I got a reluctant Larry to agree and we safely crossed Moosehead Lake. We followed our GPS units trail markings NW to Rockwood and picked up ITS 88. The trails continued to be smooth and we made great time heading SW towards the Forks and eventually Coburn Mountain. At Coburn Mountain's base trailhead sign, Larry and I came up with our strategy in how we wanted to attack this notorious Summit Trail. We decided it would be best to give each other plenty of space in case one of us loses traction and starts to slide backwards down the trail, allowing the person following enough time to get out of the way.

We began our ride up the Summit Trail and it became clear to me that this is not a trail the inexperienced rider should attempt. Most of the trail is barely two sleds wide, extremely steep and trenched out from folks sawing their way through

the ungroomed snow which is now filled with boiler plate ice. Once at the top, your reward is an amazing view from over 3,000 feet high. Unfortunately, we hit snow squalls at the top, limiting our view. After spending some time checking out the scenery, we made the treacherous descent back down the mountain and hopped back onto ITS89 West towards our final destination Jackman, Maine. We arrived in Jackman safe and sound, with no injuries or accidents, just after sunset.


#### **IN SUMMARY: OVER 1,100 MILES TRAVELED**

#### Lessons Learned:

Some things to think about if you plan on making a Backpacking Trip.

- Plan, Plan and Plan, this can't be understated. The unexpected "will happen"
- Have survival gear, waterproof fire material, dry clothes
- Have Paper Maps, Road and Trail, do not rely solely on GPS units.
- Charged Phone with a Back up power supply.
- Have an experienced rider familiar with the area, if possible.
- Contingency plans Make sure you have some.
- Extra Fuel, Water and Food
- If travelling into Canada, know the current rules. "Use Arrive-CAN" before your trip, even though we have heard restrictions are being lifted as I write this.
- Be aware, many restaurants, gas stations, hotels and clubs have not re-opened since Covid-19.
- Always let someone know your day to day plans.
- This goes without saying, but have spare relays, spark plugs, belts and a portable jumper in your group.
- Trails are not always where they may have been.
- Do not ride above your level of expertise.
- Ride RIGHT and stay ALERT!! This could save your life. Dozens of times during this trip I encountered riders on my side of the trail.

### **Savoy Kanary Kats**

#### Get out and explore!

We all love the crisp sound of the track in the snow, the sound of the skegs as they bite into a hard-packed, perfectly groomed trail. Did you ever catch yourself wondering what you're driving past... an old farm from the 1800s, a historic mountain cemetery, a famous tannery from the 1700s? Well, the Savoy Kanary Kats trail system has something for everyone, including history buffs and explorers alike. Our trail system has about 75 miles of high elevation trails ranging from old town roads, logging trails and narrow sidewinders. Our fleet of 4 large groomers including 3 LMC1800s and a Tucker 2000 keeps the big trails flat and fast while our three groomer sleds (including two Bear Cats and a Scandic) make the tighter trails flat and fun.

ILUB NEWS

Although we groom the trails in Hawley and Windsor, the heart of our system is in Savoy. The first settlements started in 1771, it was named Savoy in 1797 and has a long history as you'll see. We invite you to explore some of our unique trail-side attractions both in Savoy and points nearby.





**Beehive Kiln:** The kiln was first built in 1870 and is the oldest flagstone kiln in New England, located in Hawley State Forest. It is 25 feet in diameter and 25 feet high and holds 35 cords of hard wood. Historically, the wood would be "baked" in low oxygen and the wood would convert to charcoal to be later burned. Charcoal burned much hotter than wood and was a desired commodity for blacksmithing throughout the late 1800s and early 1900s. If you go, <u>please be gentle</u> as its old and has been repaired numerous times to preserve our local history.



**CCC Camps:** The Civilian Conservation Corps created three camps in Savoy in 1932. They were created to keep men working during the great depression and employed 200-300 men at their peak. Many of projects and improvement are still in use today including dams on Bog Pond, Tannery Pond and Burnett Pond and numerous logging and replanting groves. The only visible evidence remaining of the three camps is a chimney off the east end Tannery Road heading toward Adams Road.





**Sasquatch:** Since the 1930s, there have been dozens of sasquatch sighting in the Savoy Mountain State Forest. Early CCC workers in the 1930s and 1940s, would report seeing tall, hair-covered giants wandering around. In recent years, hikers, campers and property owners have had numerous sightings. Perhaps while riding the trails, you too might see a mysterious and elusive creature wandering the woods of Savoy.



**Tower 51:** This 68' high steel tower sits atop Borden Mountain at an elevation of 2500' above sea level. It began its operation on August 1, 1913. Like a lighthouse keeper on the sea, fire wardens would staff the tower and keep a wary eye for any forest fires during the dry season of summer or fall. The State first purchased the mountain in 1917 which was the first parcel of the Savoy Mountain State Forest system.





**Tannery Falls:** Is a beautiful, quick (0.75 mile) hike off the snowmobile trail. It can be dangerous in the winter, so be safe. You'll be rewarded by a magical 80' tall waterfall from Ross Brook. You can also see the smaller Tannery Falls whose headwaters powered a tannery (place where animal hides are tanned for leather). If you drive slowly, right off the trail you might be able to make out the Tannery Pond, serving Tannery Brook and the antique spillway before the water flows to the falls. The original tannery operated in the 1840s until it burned in 1912.





**Balanced Rock:** Deep in the heart of Savoy State Forest there is a large balanced rock. Perched on a hill off Tannery Road, a balanced rock sits ominously atop of a bedrock slab. Left by a receding glacier a million years ago the large rock is a sight to see and makes the perfect stop to stretch your legs and plan your next stop.



**Pub 116:** A stop at Pub 116 is a welcomed stop to meet up with old friends or make news ones. It's a great place to grab a beverage or some of the best food for miles. The former Hilltop Colonial Inn (Hilltop) has been around a very long time and the new owners have made tons of improvement to ensure it will be around for years to come.

# **Return to the N.E.K.**

osh Newey's first snowmobiling trip to the Northeast Kingdom of Vermont was January 11th, 1997. Unfortunately, he would not make his 2nd trip until 25 years later in February of 2022.

It was an exciting time for Josh back in 1997. It was his first real snowmobile trip outside of Western Mass, where he grew up riding sleds, ATVs and just about anything with a motor. His first sled was a non-running 1970 Olympic that he scored for \$50 that he fixed in the seller's yard and rode it home along Rt. 112 in Worthington. It wasn't even winter yet. But driving tractor-trailer for a local trucking company allowed him to buy his first new, reliable sled in 1996; a Ski-Doo MXZ 670. And he couldn't wait to go north with his group of friends to experience riding in the NEK.

Most of the details of the night of the 10th are still fuzzy. Heavy snow falling, riding with a group of riders who were more experienced with the trail system and on a new sled made for unfortunate events, Josh missed a turn. He ended up with a fractured neck at C5 and C6 levels, resulting in a spinal cord injury, along with compound fractures in his right leg. Treating the leg injuries took precedence to get him stabilized. But the spinal cord injuries would leave Josh a quadriplegic. Josh credits his friends Garrett Barry and George Cone, along with others for helping emergency services get him out of the woods and to the hospital.

But this is a story about triumph and perseverance. No, sadly, Josh isn't walking today. But he does have limited arm and hand movement, allowing him to drive a wheelchair-accessible minivan. It's no Freightliner, but he gets around his home area of Bridgewater, MA and he makes the trek out to Western Mass a few times a year. And his passion for things with motors hasn't faded. Always a savvy negotiator, Josh was able to trade an old Ford pickup he picked up for a 1947 McCormick Os4 orchard tractor. After his father, Rich, took Josh and his tractor to many show and events, Josh got a wild idea about setting up a wheelchair lift to the back of the tractor. This particular model tractor had a hand clutch from the factory! Seemed it was destiny for it to come into Josh's possession. While we all sat through the trials of COVID, Josh and our friend Dan Routhier came up with the blueprints and fabrication to get Josh behind the wheel. Now Josh is able to attend tractor shows, fairs and events and he gets to drive.

So, now the wheels were turning. Josh had been talking about going back up to VT for a very long time. But he wanted to get there on a sled. Now that the tractor project was up and running, he put his efforts into finding a sled to modify. Not just any sled, mind you. He wanted a 1996 Ski-Doo MXZ 670. As luck would have it, he found an old, clapped out MXZ 670 on Cape Cod for \$200. Friends Jeff and Marta Ovitt hauled it back to Worthington where more friends were willing and waiting to turn wrenches on it and bring it back to life. Kyle Challet, Greg Joyner and Kevin Kukucka breathed life into the moss-covered relic and with a \$50 backrest, they had a 2-up touring sled.

March 7th 2021, Josh, with the help of his friends, was able to swing a leg over the seat of his own MXZ and go for a ride. He, along with Dan, Kyle, Greg, friends Tina LaCriox and Jim Parsons and myself, ventured out of Kyle's house in Worthington and ride to the powerlines in Windsor, MA and back, stopping at Liston's for celebratory burgers and refreshments, then back to Kyle's to bask in the glory of Josh's conquest. Looking at josh through the 2-stroke exhaust that filled the garage, I could see the wheels turning again.

Josh came out to my house for a barbeque in July and we hatched a plan to get him back out on the trails of upstate VT. The whole gang was there to help formulate our plans. Machines were lined up and a tentative date was set for Josh's return to the NEK. Unfortunately, the '96 670 was not the best machine to make such an adventure. But I had purchased a 2009 Ski-Doo GTX 600 before the winter and Josh was able to make it to my house for some test fitting. 'The Couch", as we called it, was perfect; comfortable seat, heated grips and plugs for an electric visor on Josh's helmet and a plug for heated socks! The weather did not cooperate with us for early January and the 25th anniversary of his accident, but Josh was determined to get up there and ride that season.

On February 5th, Josh, chauffeured by Dan on the GTX, myself on my sled and Dan's wife Colleen and Josh's friend Steph Ornelas on my older Polaris 2-up Deluxe, left the rental house in Morgan, VT and made tracks east towards Canaan, Josh's last stop before the accident. There were some stops for adjustments of straps and jackets to make sure Josh was secure and warm, and we stopped at the Drift Dusters Warming Hut in Derby for a great photo opt. Josh had a smile that filled his helmet. Trails were decent for a Saturday and we made it to Kendyl's Buns on the Run for a trail-side snack and to sign the trailer wall. Then we made our way to Chez Pidgeon in Norton to meet up with friends. The owners were quite surprised when I went in and asked for a chair to take outside. I told them one of our riders was paralyzed
