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#### President's Message

#### **Preservation of Trails**

rails are a priority, it's what SAM is all about. One of our biggest challenges is land changing hands. Many landowners sell, donate or conserve land, believing that the snowmobile trail will stay in place. That's not always the case, even when a state agency is involved. By knowing ahead of time, SAM can be proactive and work to preserve the trail before the transaction. Before is the operative word.

If you hear that land containing a trail is being sold or transferred, contact the SAM office ASAP. Even if you hear a rumor. The same goes for land that abuts a trail. Don't wait a single minute, get in touch!

If you own land that has a snowmobile trail and would like to protect it, let us know. Matter of fact, if you own land and would like to preserve it in trust, we can help.

For the past few years SAM has been developing a trail preservation program and this year we finally were able to put it to use. None of this would have been possible without cooperation from generous landowners and a growing relationship with several land trusts.

The Franklin Land Trust conserved 46 acres in Leyden known as Zimmerman Farm in 2013. ITS-2 is a key trail managed by the BGL Club that crosses the property. The east-west run in the northern portion of the state connects Northfield to Colrain and trails to the New York and Vermont border.

A staff member from Franklin Land Trust attended a SAM meeting in the spring and explained the importance of the land and the value of conserving the property. SAM was able to partner in the project and the trail is now preserved within the protected property.

Cowls Sawmill & Land Company completed the largest conservation restriction on private land since the 1920's in a partnership between the Department of Fish and Game, Kestrel Land Trust and the Franklin Land Trust. The deal resulted in the protection of 3,486 acres of working forest land in the towns of Leverett and Shutesbury. The Cowls have always been active in promoting and preserving recreational

opportunities and have pledged to keep the snowmobile trail intact.

In the town of Spencer, 350 acres of prime real estate had long been eyed for development. The Sibley and Warner Farms make up one of the most spectacular undeveloped properties in Central Massachusetts. A major snowmobile trail, ITS-71, has been managed by the Snowbirds Snowmobile Club for decades, losing it would be crippling.

SAM and the Snowbirds worked with Common Ground Land Trust, Mass Audubon, The Town of Spencer and the Greater Worcester Land Trust. The project was daunting. Almost \$3 million dollars had to be raised and the town was obligated to spend \$700,000. But that had to pass a vote at town meeting.


The Snowbirds sent 1,000 letters to members and businesses in town asking that they not only vote yes but also to open their wallets and donate money. The vote passed, the fundraising was successful and the land and trail are now protected.

In Conway, Roger and Joanne Clapp signed a conservation restriction on approximately 36 acres of their property with the Franklin Land Trust. That property contained a major snowmobile trail.

While the conservation restriction is very clear about the prohibited use of motorized vehicles, the Clapps understood the importance of outdoor recreation and put specific language for the continued use of snowmobiles. For their thoughtfulness, the Clapp family were honored with the 2013 Friend of SAM award.

SAM has a new perspective, a new set of priorities. In the past we were strictly trail managers, now we are part of the preservation community. Our core beliefs are very much alike.

Snowmobilers need to be involved and keep SAM informed of any opportunities to preserve open space and our trails. We are actively pursuing fundraising opportunities and look forward to building relationships in future conservation projects. We need your help to make this goal a reality.

They host safety courses and work closely with the Massachusetts Environmental Police to promote safe, responsible snowmobiling. Their members responded to the South Shore last winter to assist the state's effort to restore electricity after the blizzard.

One of their biggest achievements was working with local land trusts to protect Sibley Farm and gain a permanent easement on their main trail.

John Berthiaume, Brad Rand, Rich Lapierre, Willie Davies, David MacLeod and Matt Graves accepted the award for the club.

FRIEND OF SAM: The Snowmobile Association of Massachusetts recognizes a family that has long supported recreation and snowmobiling, despite not being snowmobilers themselves. They've always understood the importance of snowmobiling to the area and the overall trail system.

Just over a year ago Roger and Joanne Clapp signed a conservation restriction with the Franklin Land Trust on approximately 36 acres in Conway, of which a major snowmobile trail travels through. While the conservation restriction is very clear about the prohibited use of motorized vehicles, the Clapp's understood that snowmobiles are different and put specific wording in the Conservation Restriction to allow continued snowmobile use.

Of significant importance is what the Clapps did as "A Friend of SAM" without any discussion or persuasion from



the club. Roger and Joanne required that snowmobile use continue, all on their own. In fact, the club was made aware of the conservation restriction and specific wording after the document was complete. If there were ever a true friend to

SAM and the Conway Snowmobile Club, it is Roger and Joanne Clapp.

Ronald Sweet and Craig Warner of the Conway Snowmobile Club accepted the award and later presented it to the Clapp family.



#### YEAR: Dan Gould not only motivates others to step up to the plate but has led by example and personally

made key contributions to snowmobiling on a local, state, national and international level.

Over the past decade as president of Snowmobile Association of Massachusetts he has assembled a first class, business-oriented, executive committee to

operate SAM on a day-to-day basis and help lead SAM from a simple club-type organization into a first class statewide business organization with political recognition throughout the state.

Dan has transformed the state association's publication, website, mobile website and social media outlets into state of the art platforms that serve our membership.

# The Great American Ski Test: Part III

as a new king been crowned or is the Simmons ski still at the top of the heap? Read on loyal followers and you will soon find out what is the hot set-up this year.

To recap, we have tested the SLP Straight Line Tracking, Simmons original Flexi-Ski and the C&A RZ Razors. We know that the Simmons reign supreme in this writer's eyes for its cornering precision, minimal darting and precise tracking. A tough act to follow, indeed.

Now for the new kid on the block, the Curve XS Ski System made by Curve Industries, with a base price of \$368. I had seen these skis on the trails and heard good feedback from riders, I just knew I had to get my hands on a pair. A quick

call to the head honchos in upper New
York and shortly thereafter a package
arrived with Curve skis inside.

Right out of the box I noticed the curvature to the length of the skis, much like shape skis which revolutionized downhill skiing. Would the precise turning of downhill skis transfer to the snowmobile world? We shall see.

Beefy and robust, with "Tivar" embossed in raised letters, you know right away these curved skis mean business. They weigh in at a svelt 8.1 pounds and have space for one carbide runner. The Curve is a system of pieces that make up a unique ski. There is an optional Thruster for soft or deep snow that bolts to the outside of each ski, protruding beyond the edge like a little wing. I'm a groomed trail rider so the Thrusters weren't tested, but the Leading Edge plate was installed right

away. The Leading Edge is a small angular block that bolts to the underside of the ski in front of the carbide. The design prevents the ski from diving into ruts made by other skis and eliminates something called deceleration tracking.

Installing the skis on my Cat was a snap and by far the easiest to date. Perhaps it's because I've done it so many times. The life of a tester is not easy you know! Straightaway I noticed how easy it was to get on and off the trailer. Not quite sure why, but the single runner and keel design may have something to do with this very pleasant trait.

After unloading, I hit the trail. Right off the bat I noticed how easy it was to turn at walking speeds. These skis were also easy to maneuver while backing up, and short-slow speed adjustments for trail My heart was pounding as I hit the throttle in anxious anticipation of what I thought these skis would be capable of.

hazards produced no measurable seat-ofthe-pants bad manners. Nice!

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My heart was pounding as I hit the throttle in anxious anticipation of what I thought these skis would be capable of. I had no way of knowing which way this test would go, thumbs up or thumbs down, but there I was, in the cold north, eagerly awaiting the hands-on results of the Great American Ski Test!

As speed picked up I discovered that the skis really tracked well around corners. I found myself going a little too fast but couldn't help it as they inspired confidence. Funny how these things work. When it feels right you know it straightaway. I said to myself, "Slow down, get control of yourself, there will be a time and place to turn the heat up." Safety instructors from various disciplines had drilled into my head that overconfidence and unfamiliarity with new equipment is a recipe for disaster. 'Nuff said there.

The skis darted some and I wondered if a slight ski alignment tweak could fix it. A quick toe out adjustment of 1/4 inch, and the problem got measurably better. After lunch I went out again to explore more of the confidence-inspiring cornering, with no wobbles, miscues or off trail excursions. These are not full-blown race skis but are darn close in cornering precision. The C&A's take that title, but if you purchase the Curves you would not be embarrassed around any corner that is white!

Riding down the trail I realized I had to spin around after missing a trailhead. As with most trails, safe places to turn around are few and far between. I wanted to test the skis off-trail and here was an opportunity. Going off the groomed surface I braced myself for some bogging due to the deep snow, thinking I may even get stuck. For those of you that don't know, I ride a Arctic Cat four-stroke, and that is one sled you do not want to get stuck. Out in the deep, I was pleasantly surprised; there were no ill effects whatsoever, it just glided along like nothing ever happened. I suspect the curved ski shape helped here as the leading and trailing edges are wider than the waist of the ski. Bonus!

If you do have to move the skis by hand, the loops are not so ergonomic. They may hurt your hands, but the loops are made to last and might have some effect on how

the front of the ski absorbs trail junk and shock. Perhaps a little redesign may be in order here, but not a big deal.

So, are the Simmons dethroned? Let's do a rundown. The original Simmons Flexi-Ski has very precise cornering, planes up on the snow above 25 mph, offers easy steering, cool looks and a tremendous amount of shock absorption. On the downside, they sink a little bit off trail, seem to follow other dual carbide ski tracks and are a bit harder to turn at walking speeds and turnarounds. They may be expensive but with zero push and an attitude that holds a line with an iron fist, they are worth it.

For absolute zero darting and good grip in the corners, it's the SLP Straight Line Tracking, hands down. Thumbs up here for a lightweight and thoughtful design. A slight push in the corners, but again, most riders would never notice. Limited somewhat in runner choices but the ski just works.

## The Curve XS gets my vote as the best all-around trail ski.

The C&A RZ Razors track well, are a hardy ski and corner better than the SLP's, but despite adjustments, dart the most of all. Cool factor is that they're following in the footsteps of racy big brother, the C&A Pros. Definitely a good choice for the hard core, aggressive, rider, although the handlebar push/pull technique is needed to really get the most out of these boards.

With its somewhat radical look, easy steering at any speed, ultra-precise cornering, no push, very minimal darting and excellent off trail manners, the Curve XS gets my vote as the best all-around trail ski. Clicking off the miles is just a pure delight with these boards. The leading edge and keel shape really do tone down the

darting and virtually eliminate deceleration darting. Rutted trails are no problem as this ski seems to make its own path. I think the flared tail is responsible for some of the precise cornering. The Curves are not wiry and do not wear you out after a two-hundred-mile day, like some others I've tried. When you let off the throttle the ski seems to glide somewhat easier than the others, much like adding ski wax to downhill skis. Not quite sure how they pulled that one off, but I like it anyways.

A new king is crowned! How long will it take for the others to catch and surpass? Stay tuned! Seriously, any of the above skis would be an excellent choice for all the reasons stated above and keep in mind that ski behavior varies from snowmobile to snowmobile. The best thing about aftermarket skis is that you can take them off when you trade in your ride and then slap 'em on the new buggy! Win, win! Next up: Duraflex ice scratchers. Do they work?



# SAM Assists With Blizzard Recovery

emories of the Blizzard of 2013 have melted away by the heat and humidity of the summer but is was only a half year ago that we experienced one of the greatest storms in decades. On February 8 and 9, Massachusetts was buried by a category 3 Noreaster nicknamed Nemo that dumped 20 to 30 inches across the region. Schools were closed, state of emergencies declared and many roads were shut down for days. Electricity was lacking, to say the least, and getting it restored looked to be a major undertaking, especially in the eastern part of the state.

The Snowmobile Association of Massachusetts was contacted by NSTAR, as part of the Governor's Command Center, to assist in the restoration of electric power. NSTAR reached out to SAM once it realized that specialized snowmobile equipment and operators would be needed to access remote transmission lines on the South Shore. SAM members responded with utility snowmobiles and small groomers to transport NSTAR engineers to assess damage in Plymouth, Yarmouth and several other locations.

On the heels of the blizzard, seven SAM members dropped everything and

headed to the storm damaged region immediately: Brad Rand, Rich Lapierre, John Berthiaume, Matt Graves, and Dale Hovagimian of the Snowbirds Snowmobile Club, along with Scott Sumner of the Conway Club, and SAM treasurer, Jeff Miller of BGL. SAM Executive Director Rena Sumner and President Dan Gould coordinated between NSTAR officials and SAM members as preparations were made.

A day after the storm cleared NSTAR had about 175,000 customers without power on the South Shore and Cape Cod, utility representatives predicting it would take a few more days to get power back online. Some felt that was a bit optimistic.

NSTAR used helicopters to identify potential problems and then SAM members ferried engineers out to trouble spots to review the situation and verify what was needed to restore power.

Brad Rand reported that he and Dale Hovagimian transported NSTAR staff for miles along utility lines, stopping at every tower for inspection. They ultimately discovered a transmission line crossing another line. Power had to be cut to 40,000 homes in order for the repair to be made.

Scott Sumner and Jeff Miller worked in Carver, Duxbury and Marshfield. Using the Bernardston-Gill-Leyden club's groomer, they ferried engineers to areas along the high-tension lines that were not easily accessible.

They reported seeing a lot of large trees on damaged houses and lines down everywhere. "It was pretty well a war zone," said Scott. "We snowmobile because we love it but it was nice to help other people," Jeff said. "It's not something we do very often but we are always available to help in an emergency."

A few days after power was restored SAM received an email from Joan Soper who said, "I personally want to thank the Snowmobile Association for its kindness during our recent storm. I have family in Plymouth, a nephew, his wife and two sons. He had his sister and her two children with him when the power went out. I know that your contribution of assistance was a great help and probably lessened the time that the residents were helpless."

"You could have been home with your families or out having fun in the snow.



You are now part of my unsung heroes, I will be letting my family and friends know of your kindness. Thank you, again."

SAM volunteers have assisted state agencies, municipalities and rescue personal on many occasions in the past and will continue to respond when needed. Getting a note of appreciation was uplifting and reminds us how important volunteering in our community is.

This daylong event on May 2 was unique in bringing together approximately 195 attendees and participants that embodied a broad array of trail-based organizations. Just a few of the groups partaking in this event were the Appalachian Mountain Club, Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR), Trustees of Reservations, Pioneer Valley Planning Commission (PVPC), Snowmobile Association of Massachusetts (SAM), and the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (DOT). Other attendees

included various "friends groups," trail users, conservation commissions, bike trail committees, land trusts and volunteers. Snowmobile attendees included Dave Purple; Dean Zuppio, MARTAB snowmobile representative; Lawrence Tucker; and SAM President, Dan Gould, who was also one of the presenters.

The event was sponsored by the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) and the Massachusetts Recreational Trails Advisory Board (MARTAB) and was hosted at the Devens Commons Center in Devens. Special thanks go to Amanda Lewis, Recreational Trails Program contact for the DCR, and Dick O'Brien, the Chairman of MARTAB, for their tireless efforts to bring this event to fruition.

This unique conference brought together a wide cross section of trails enthusiasts, all of whom have the very similar goal of creating and maintaining a trail system. The opportunity for networking served to both create and strengthen partnerships and coalitions, which hopefully are laying the foundation for a more unified approach to building our collective trail systems for the future.

16 very fascinating and productive workshop sessions were offered. Topics such as Private and Public Funding for Trails, Preserving Trail Corridors, Working with Conservation Commissions, State Trail Mapping Efforts and many other very informative topics were presented. I attended the "Creating and Preserving Trail Corridors" session, which was co-led by SAM President, Dan Gould. This presen-

tation emphasized the sometimes-amazing results that can be achieved when groups work together. This workshop, presented by the people who were actually involved in the project, described how a very important parcel of land was saved and how the snowmobile trail on it was preserved. It was a very enlightening workshop. I also attended State Trail Mapping Efforts, which was led by Chris Curtis, Chief Planner for the PVPC. It offered an insight into the mapping tools available to all.

Of particular interest to snowmobilers and the motorized recreational community in general was the presentation on Recreational Trails Program (RTP) Grants. This was presented by Amanda Lewis, the DCR's RTP contact, and was very relevant to helping motorized groups apply for these federal funds for trail-related projects. A workshop for any snowmobile club having a trail that crosses a body of water titled "Working with Conservation Commissions" was also offered. Thanks to the efforts of Amanda Lewis at DCR, most of the presentations are available online and are posted at http://www.mass.gov/ dcr/stewardship/greenway/conference.htm

This conference was first and foremost a very educational opportunity for everyone and was certainly a great opportunity to network. But it also left me with the feeling that the seeds of unity within the trail community were beginning to grow. There was a sense that all are slowly realizing that by sharing and helping each other, all of our goals can come to fruition with more benefits to all.

Another underlying common thread for this conference was the growing recognition of the importance for the connectivity within our trails systems. This connectivity for bike trails, hiking trails, snowmobile trails and rail trails is the common denominator all enthusiasts share. I believe there will be increased attention of this topic at future Trails Conferences.

Thanks again to Amanda Lewis and Dick O'Brien for putting this event together. I hope to see everyone again next year. And, remember, snowmobilers are environmentalists.


